	Y	24	Early Family Support Services (EFSS)	EFSS serves families whose CPS referrals are determined to be low risk or moderately low risk at intake or following investigation.	\$2,350,000
	N	32	Evidence Based Practices (EBP) Models	Family interventions models that are proven to provide good outcomes, supported by research and have been replicated. EBP models include: Parent Child Interaction Therapy, Functional Family Therapy , Incredible Years, Triple P, Project Safe Care, Promoting First Relationships, and Nurse Family Partnerships	\$1,550,000
	Y	82	Crisis Family Intervention Services	Voluntary in-home services focused on developing skills and supports within families to resolve problems related to at-risk youth in need of services or in family conflict. These services are devoted to maintaining the family as a unit and preventing the out-of-home placement of adolescents.	\$1,970,000
	Y	100	Family Preservation Services (FPS)	FPS is provided to families whose children are at "substantial likelihood" of foster care placement or to reunify a child with their family from out-of-home care. Interventions focus on resolving the immediate crisis and strengthening a family's relationships through a variety of community resources. FPS are available to families within 48 hours of referral and are offered for a maximum of six months by a FPS provider.	\$8,070,000
	Y	2	Homebuilders	Homebuilder services are available to families whose children are at "imminent risk" of foster care placement or to reunify a child with their family from out-of-home care. Homebuilders services are intensive in-home therapeutic services that focus on improving the family's ability to overcome a crisis situation and remain safely together. Services are available 24/7 for 40 days, or paraprofessional services for up to 90 days.	\$4,720,000
	N	10	Intensive Stabilization/ Wrap-Around Services	Services are provided in-home and less often in placement. Services assess family strengths and weaknesses, and provide creative, flexible solutions which may include teaching and modeling parenting and problem-solving skills, crisis stabilization, case management, conflict resolution, case coordination, resource coordination and referral, and other services to prevent out of home placements or reunification of youth.	\$3,230,000
N	10	Parent Education	Parenting skills training, dependency navigation, and bio-parent mentoring.	\$540,000

	Y	71	Child Placing Agencies	Services focus on stabilization of youth in a licensed foster home and reunification with the biological family or movement into a permanent resource. Services include cases management, and if requested: intensive case management, case aids, parent child/sibling visits, follow up care, borrowed home and respite care.	\$7,420,000
	N	9	Respite Care/Case Aid	Purchase of hourly case aide services not covered by the regular DSHS medical coupons for a child in foster care placement. Contracted Case Aid Services are used to meet supervision and monitoring requirements for children in foster care and to augment services to maintain placement stability.	\$1,650,000
	Y	78	Visit Services	Visit Services provides transportation and supervision for visits between children in out-of-home care and their families.	\$10,390,000
	N	7	Receiving Care/Assessment Centers	Transitional placements for children needing emergency housing. Assessment of child to provide best match for foster care placement. Coordination of community supports to meet child and family needs.	\$2,550,000
	Y	2	Foster Care and CPS Assessment Programs	Program assesses children who have been in out-of-home placement for more than 90 days and are in need of intensive planning to help ensure permanency; and families with intensive CPS issues.	\$1,965,000

	N	5	Child Hospitalization Alternative Program (CHAPS)	Treatment foster care and/or in-home program provides intensive community-based wraparound services for youth who are chronically mentally ill with severe emotional and behavior problems.	\$1,640,000
	N	48	Client Specific Intensive Residential Services	Client specific intensive residential services which are provided in-state or out-of-state.	\$6,470,000
	Y	66	Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS)	BRS provides a high level of care and treatment for children and youth with the most severe and intensive needs. BRS is time limited with a focus on a return to a less restrictive environment. Services are offered in an array of settings including the child's home, a treatment foster home or a group residential setting. BRS also includes a Multidimensional Treatment Foster Care program which is an EBP that increases appropriate behavior in youth and increases stability.	\$56,720,000
N	3	Pediatric Interim Care (PIC)	Services are provided to drug-affected children ages birth to 3 years. Services address particular needs of drug affected children	\$1,500,000

	N	4	Regional Crisis Residential Centers (CRCs)	CRCs provide temporary shelter for youth ages 12 through 17 who run away from home, are in severe conflict with their parents, or foster youth in need of a crisis placement. Services are available 24/7. Placement is limited to a maximum of 15 days, and services are focused on assessment of needs and family reunification.	\$2,700,000
	Y	7	Secure Crisis Residential Centers (SCRCs)	SCRCs are available 24/7 for short-term placements of up to 5 days for runaways placed by law enforcement. Like Regional CRCs services focus is on assessment of needs and family reunification.	\$2,910,000
	N	5	HOPE Centers	Hope Centers are temporary residential placements for street youth for up to 30 days. Hope Centers are intended to stabilize an adolescent, perform comprehensive assessments of the youth's physical and mental health, identify substance abuse problems and education status, and develop a long-term permanent plan.	\$1,130,000
	N	5	Responsible Living Skills Program	The program offers a permanent placement setting and independent living skills to youth who are considered "street youth" and who agree to participate fully in the program. Youth must not have a permanency plan of return home.	\$1,160,000
	Y	6	Street Youth	Community-based outreach and case management targeting youth engaged in lifestyles characterized as homeless. These children, referred to as street youth, are living away from their homes and may be chemically dependent, actively involved in prostitution or delinquent behaviors. Services are aimed at engaging and assisting youth in ending this lifestyle.	\$870,000
	Y	11	Independent Living Skills (ILS)/Transitional Living Support (TLS)	A federal act requires states to identify youth who are likely to remain in foster care until age 18 and to provide those youth with a variety of ILS. Services include education, training and support in the areas of educational stability and achievement, vocational training. Transitional living support services include assistance in accessing safe and stable housing, employment training, placement and retention services, and support toward the attainment of either a high school diploma or GED certificate.	\$2,880,000

	N	3	Medicaid Treatment Child Care	This program provides medically necessary psycho-social services to young children at risk of child abuse and neglect. Each child is assessed and an individualized treatment plan is developed to address the needs identified in the assessment.	\$4,800,000
	Y	586	Psychological/Psychiatric Services	Psychological or psychiatric evaluations; counseling, therapy, treatment; parenting assessments; chemical dependency assessments and treatment; adult sexual deviancy evaluation; parenting instruction; developmental assessments; domestic violence perpetrator treatment; medication management; neuropsychological testing.	\$6,080,000
	Y	50	Sexually Aggressive Youth Services	Special programs are offered for sexually aggressive youth. Comprehensive intervention and treatment services are available for children who meet the definition of sexually aggressive youth as defined in RCW 74.13.075. These services include one-time expenses for testing, monitoring equipment, or emergency interventions as well as ongoing evaluations, treatment and supervision.	\$340,000
